Aleksnitz [Oleksinets] (p. 1)

Nowy Aleksiniec, E of Lvov

Located south of Kremenitz, next to the old town Aleksnitz, where in 1760 one of the first Hebrew presses in Russia was established. E.J. article Novy Oleksiniec.

Brezits (Velikiye Berezhtsy) (p. 10)

Berezcy, E of Lvov

Located west of and close to the city of Kremenitz. Early 19^{th} century - A Hebrew press operated here. 20^{th} century - About 25 Jewish families lived here before World War II.

Katerburg [Katerinovka] (p. 34)

Katerburg, E of Lvov

Located southeast of and close to Kremenitz. 1801 – Abraham Abli, rabbi of Katerinburg, died in Brody. He was a son of Yosef Yoski, author of *Ohel Yosef*. Kagan 7098.

Kremenitz (p. 43)

Kremenets, also Krzemieniec, NE of Lvov

1885 - Hamelitz printed a report from Zvi Prilutzki in Kremenitz. 1894 - Zvi Hirsh Prilutzki was local deputy for the Eretz Israel farmers and workers support association. World War I - The old cemetery was visited during the war by the writer S. An-Ski (author of the Dibbuk story) who was searching for gravestones of the relatives of a famous rabbi; he found and photographed them. The Nazis destroyed the old cemetery in World War II. Birthplace of Isaac Ber Levinson 1788-1860, writer, called founder of the enlightenment among the Jews in Russia. Memorial

books Pinkas Kremenitz, 1954, and Kremenitz, Vizhgorodok, un Patchiev, 1965. E.J. article Kremenets. Kagan 7907.

Lanovitz [Lanovtsy] (p. 46)

Lanowce, E of Lvov

Located south of Kremenitz. Israel Zinberg 1873-1943, born in a village near Lanovitz, was an historian of Yiddish literature in Russia. Birthplace of Louis Miller, born 1887, who moved to the United States in 1906 and was a Yiddish author. Memorial book *Lanovitz*, 1970. Kagan 4235.

Pitcheyev, Potchayev (p. 73)

Pochayev, also Poczajow, NE of Lvov Located southwest of and close to Kremenitz. Memorial book *Pitchayever Yizkor Buch*, 1960. Kagan 6536.

Radzivilov, Rodvil (p. 80)

Radziwillow, also Chervonoarmeysk, NE of Lvov Located west of and close to Kremenitz. 1894 - Yakov Veitzer was local deputy for the Eretz Israel farmers and workers support association. Memorial book *Radzivilov*, 1966. E.J. article Radziwillow. Kagan 7963.

Vishnivitz (p. 112)

Wisnowiec, also Vishnevets, E of Lvov Located south of and close to Kremenitz. Memorial book *Vishnivitz*. E.J. article Vishnevets. Kagan 2880.

Yampol (p. 119)

Yampol, E of Lvov

Located southeast of Kremenitz. Memorial book Irah Belhavot. Pinkas Yampola (Pelech Vohlin), 1963. Kagan 3961.
